This took most part of the 2017-2018 school year as we were only able to start it after our national laws came into force in August 2017. However, we were able to start the work and prepare materials for our RuokaTutka campaign (Food Radar). The campaign was launched in September 2018, so even though materials were prepared and purchased during the 2017-2018 school year, children only started participating in the fall of 2018. This decision was made to make as big of an impact as possible. This would not have been the case if we would have launched the campaign in July 2018 when all the children were on holiday.
