2. NEEDS AND RESULTS TO BE ACHIEVED

2.1. Identified needs

The Scheme will help to effectively combat the following problems:

- 1) the growing number of overweight or obese children and young people of school age,
- 2) the increasing incidence of lifestyle-related illnesses caused by an inappropriate diet, the causes of which include a failure to instil healthy eating habits at a young age,
- 3) insufficient consumption of fruit, vegetables and milk in Poland.

2.3. Baseline

Article 23(8) of the basic act and Article 2(1)d of the implementing regulation

Evaluations of the Scheme in respect of baseline data (the initial situation) are based on 'panel studies' of a given group under the Scheme. This means that evaluations should take into account an assessment of the '0' baseline situation for the group under the Scheme being evaluated. Consequently, children's initial intake of individual products will be determined once the evaluation process has begun as a starting point for further examination.

Having in mind that new guidelines are not yet completed as well as the contract for conducting evaluation has not been so far concluded it is recommended by National Food and Nutrition Institute to carry on the "0" baseline study at the beginning of the school year 2018/2019. It ought to be done in the period September/October, so before school scheme distribution for pupils entering primary schools starts.

Inclusion of the cottage cheese in the servings delivered in the school scheme is due to the assumption that pupils ought to be acquainted with the whole set of flavours offered by different dairy products. Composition of the cottage cheeses delivered in the school scheme must meet producer standards as well high quality requirements according to the marketing standards. Such products may contain small quantity of salt according to factory recipes used in manufacturing process, which is usually up to 0,75 g/100g.

In the 74 dairy servings planned to be distributed during 2017/2018 school year 48 servings are fresh milk (65% of the total). As far as the F&V component is concerned out of total 85 portions the fresh fruits and vegetables amounts for 95%.

6. ACCOMPANYING EDUCATIONAL MEASURES

Article 23(10) of the basic act and Article 2(1)j of the implementing regulation

Scope of accompanying activities

Based on the Regulation of the Minister for National Education, head teachers of primary schools participating in the Scheme are required to ensure, starting from 2017/2018 school year, that schools carry out activities which shape healthy eating habits amongst pupils and enhance their knowledge of where agricultural products come from. During each school semester, it is intended that at least two of the activities identified by the Minister for National Education will be carried out.

In the first school year covered by this strategy (2017/2018), the budget for educational activities will be devoted to preparing a package of teaching materials for teachers, pupils and parents with the aim of supporting educational activities defined in the Regulation of the Minister for National Education, elaborated in different forms suited for a given activity and target group and which may be used in the subsequent years of the strategy.

7.5. Selection of suppliers

Article 23(8) of the basic act and Article 2(1)l of the implementing regulation

SYSTEM FOR DISTRIBUTING ELIGIBLE PRODUCTS TO SCHOOL PUPILS

Responsibility for supplying the eligible products to primary schools participating in the Scheme will lie either with the primary schools themselves acting as suppliers or with suppliers approved for the Scheme.

Under **OPTION I**, the eligible products are to be supplied to primary schools on the basis of contracts concluded between the schools and approved suppliers. The approved suppliers, as the entities responsible for supplying the eligible products, will act as applicants.

Only operators with the organisational resources necessary for the proper conduct of activities related to fruit and vegetable or dairy product distribution may be designated as approved suppliers. They must have been active in the production, processing or marketing of dairy, fruit or vegetable products for at least 6 months prior to applying for approval. Such operators must apply to the KOWR [National Centre for Agricultural Assistance] for approval.

Approved suppliers who distribute eligible products for only one of the components (i.e. fruit/vegetables or dairy) may conclude contracts to supply products for free with any primary school, including those wishing to distribute products under both components of the scheme.

Approved suppliers who have supplied schools under contracts concluded for the free supply of eligible products may, where those products were then made available by primary schools in the manner provided for in the Annex to the strategy, apply to the KOWR for financial aid.

Under **OPTION II**, primary schools will supply themselves with the eligible products needed to prepare the servings to be distributed to their pupils. In such cases, the primary schools will act as the applicants.

7.6. Eligible costs

7.6.1. Reimbursement rules

Article 23(8) of the basic act and Article 2(1)i of the implementing regulation

For the distribution and provision of fruit, vegetables, milk and dairy products to children pursuant to Article 5(1)(a) of Commission Delegated Regulation (EU) 2017/40 of 3 November 2016 supplementing Regulation (EU) No 1308/2013 of the European Parliament and of the Council with regard to Union aid for the supply of fruit and vegetables, bananas and milk in educational establishments and amending Commission Delegated Regulation (EU) No 907/2014, aid is calculated as the product of the appropriate aid rate for a single serving for the component in question (fruit/vegetables or dairy) and the number of servings actually distributed to children under that component. The aid rate for a single serving is calculated separately for each component and remains the same for the entire school year. The method for setting aid rates takes into account the average retail price for the products included in the serving for the five calendar years prior to the calendar year in which the school year begins.

For the 2017/2018 school year, the rate for one eligible product serving is calculated working on the assumption that a total of 84 fruit and vegetable servings and 74 dairy product servings will be distributed during a given school year.

For the fruit and vegetable component, the following are provided:

1) In the first semester:

- a) 12 servings that include apples 1 apple with a net weight of at least 150 g,
- b) 5 servings that include pears 1 pear with a net weight of at least 150 g,
- c) 2 servings that include plums 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 150 g,
- d) 1 serving that includes fruit juice 1 individual package with a net volume of at least 0.21.
- e) 7 servings that include carrots 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 90 g,
- f) 5 servings that include radishes 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 90 g,
- g) 2 servings that include sweet peppers 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 90 g,
- h) 4 servings that include tomatoes 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 90 g,
- i) 3 servings that include kohlrabi 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 90 g,
- j) 1 serving that includes vegetable juice or mixed fruit and vegetable juice 1 individual package of at least 0.2 l.

2) In the second semester:

a) 12 servings that include apples - 1 apple with a net weight of at least 150 g,

- b) 5 servings that include pears 1 pear with a net weight of at least 150 g,
- c) 2 servings that include strawberries 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 100 g,
- d) 1 serving that includes fruit juice 1 individual package with a net volume of at least 0.2 l.
 - e) 9 servings that include carrots 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 90 g,
 - f) 6 servings that include radishes 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 90 g,
 - g) 4 servings that include tomatoes 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 90 g,
 - h) 2 servings that include kohlrabi 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 90 g.
 - i) 1 serving that includes vegetable juice or mixed fruit and vegetable juice 1 individual package of at least 0.2 l.

For the dairy component, the following are provided:

- 1) In the first semester:
 - a) 27 servings of milk 1 individual package of at least 0.25 l.
 - b) 3 servings of natural yogurt 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 150 g,
 - c) 4 servings of natural kefir 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 150 g,
 - d) 3 servings of cottage cheese 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 150 g,
- 2) In the second semester:
 - a) 21 servings of milk 1 individual package of at least 0.25 l.
 - b) 5 servings of natural yogurt 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 150 g,
 - c) 6 servings of natural kefir 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 150 g,
 - d) 5 servings of cottage cheese 1 individual package with a net weight of at least 150 g,

Product costs are calculated at a flat rate which the supplier receives after the product has been distributed to schools.

Applicants will be able to submit the aid application for the cost of accompanying activities once they have been carried out. The aid application may only cover eligible costs related to the tasks carried out by applicant. Supporting documents confirming the implementation of such tasks as part of accompanying activities and proof of the expenditure incurred as a result of their implementation are to be attached to the aid application.

7.7. Involvement of authorities and stakeholders

In the preparation of the national strategy and implementation regulations of the scheme the following institution were involved:

- Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development;
- National Support Centre for Agriculture (KOWR);
- Agency for Restructuring and Modernization of Agriculture;
- Ministry of National Education;
- Ministry of Health;
- National Food and Nutrition Institute,
- Stakeholders.

Both the draft of the national strategy as well as drafts of national regulations on the school scheme were consulted with stakeholders representing the dairy and F&V sectors. The stakeholders were also taking part in the preparatory working meetings.

Stake-holders are not involved in the implementation and administration of the school programme in Poland. This scheme is carried out by the Agency for Restructuring and Modernization of Agriculture which delegates some <u>tasks</u> to KOWR.

7.8. Information and publicity

Article 23a(8) of the basic act and Article 2(1)m of the implementing regulation

The KOWR will be carrying out promotion measures informing schools and parents about the Scheme and will be publicising and disseminating information amongst the general public about all the measures forming part of the Scheme, including its key elements, namely fruit, vegetable, milk and dairy product distribution and educational activities.

As part of the programme of measures, various communication, information, advertising and promotion initiatives may be carried out, such as:

- information campaigns and activities about the Scheme in the media, including PR activities broadcast via television, radio, internet or the press,
- conferences, seminars, workshops, outdoor events, competitions and similar activities designed to provide information about the Scheme and accompanying communication tools and media coverage,
- printed material, websites, social media channels raising awareness of and promoting the Scheme,
- small gifts and prizes promoting the Scheme.

Measures will also include networking activities as a tool for sharing experience and best practice concerning the implementation of the Scheme.

As a basic means of identifying schools taking part in the Scheme, the KOWR will produce a poster in accordance with the specification and recommendations set out in Article 12 of and the Annex to Commission Delegation Regulation (EU) 2017/40. Schools taking part in the Scheme will have the poster permanently displayed in a clearly visible place at the main entrance to the school.

In addition, the KOWR will develop and use a logo for the Scheme which will be incorporated as a visual element into all activities, including the possibility of labelling product packages distributed to children. In order to raise the profile of the Scheme amongst the general public a short slogan promoting the Scheme may also be developed as a means of promoting a healthy diet for children which is rich in fruit, vegetables and dairy products.

In accordance with Article 12 of Commission Implementing Regulation (EU) 2017/39, all promotional material and measures will use the European Union flag and mention the name of the Scheme and, unless impossible due to their size, will include information on the EU's financial contribution and the Scheme's logo.

7.9. Administrative and on-the-spot checks

Article 2(2)g of the implementing regulation

The KOWR will be responsible for carrying out control activities, including on-the-spot checks. The entire audit process will be overseen by the ARiMR [Agency for Restructuring and Modernisation of Agriculture] as the accredited EU Paying Agency.

7.10. Monitoring and evaluation

Article 2(2)g of the implementing regulation

The KOWR will monitor the following aspects of the Scheme:

- 1) the system for distributing eligible products to school pupils, on the basis of
 - a) its own data,
 - b) reporting by primary schools,
 - c) data received from approved suppliers;
- 2) the system of accompanying educational activities, based on data obtained from primary schools participating in the Scheme.

In accordance with Article 8(1) and Article 10(7) of Commission Implementing Regulation (EU) 2017/39, the KOWR is to send the Commission information on the outcomes of the monitoring exercise and the results of its checks and the related findings.

Evaluation

The Scheme will be evaluated by the entity selected by the KOWR through a public procurement procedure. The adopted evaluation model will be tailored to the Scheme's final parameters and, in particular, its objectives, and will take into account the European Commission's guidelines.

Annex. Lessons learnt from implementation of the current schemes and any envisaged improvements in the design and implementation of the new scheme, taking into account the available evaluation findings and recommendations

The new School Scheme takes into account the findings and recommendations from the evaluation of the school fruit and vegetables scheme implemented in school years 2011/2012 - 2015/2016.

The target group for the fruit and vegetable component has been expanded in the new School Scheme. Previously, the "Fruits and Vegetables at School" Scheme was covered by children attending grades 0-III, while under the current School Scheme children attending grades I-V are involved.

It means every child participating in the Fruit and Vegetable component will be subjected to the impact of the Scheme for one year longer compared to "Fruits and vegetables at school" Scheme. Extending the period in which children will be influenced should have a beneficial effect on the overall effectiveness of the program, in particular in relation to changing dietary habits that result in increased consumption of fruit and vegetables.

Taking into account the findings of the evaluation of the School Fruit and Vegetable Scheme in years 2011/2012 - 2015/2016 concerning the room for improvement on the consumption of vegetables by participating children, the number of vegetables available

has been increased (from 60 grams per portion in the previous Fruits and Vegetables Scheme to 90 grams per serving under the Fruit and Vegetable component of the School Scheme). Increasing the amount of vegetables available to children should have a beneficial effect on creating a nutritional habit of consuming enough vegetables.

According to the findings of the evaluation of the School Fruit and Vegetable Scheme in years 2011/2012 - 2015/2016 concerning the effectiveness of accompanying activities, a package of teaching materials will be developed and published. It will include, among others scenarios of particular types of accompanying activities whose scope is indicated in the Regulation of the Minister of National Education. Packages of homogeneous, structured educational materials will be available to teachers in participating schools.
